CUPOLA CAPS COURTHOUSE CITADEL IN TIME FOR 180th YEAR

Just in time to celebrate the New Year, the Brentsville Historic Courthouse was topped again with her newly refurbished crown after nearly four months standing without her peak. Last August, the cupola and the bell housed within were removed from the Courthouse summit for renovation.

The cupola sat on a platform in front of the 1822 Courthouse while renovation was underway. Most of the exterior wood had to be replaced due to excessive wear, but thick interior cross beams, complete with names of a few people who left a record of being at the top were left in tact.

Local citizens were also pleased to discover that the Courthouse Bell was still housed within the cupola. There were two schools of

thought as to where the bell might have disappeared to, since no one had heard the chime for quite some time.

Brentsville's honored bell ringers on both the day the cupola descended and again ascended were Nelson Keys, who remembered ringing the bell over 50 years ago, during World War II and Gladys

hangs) casing bears an 1886 date and a "No. 22," but it is not known whether the bell was cast at an earlier date as there are no mark-

ings on the bell. The bell diameter measures 8 1/2 inches at the top and 21 inches at the bottom Height is 15 inches. The bell appears to be made of brass, however the patina is very weathered and covered with bird droppings.

The Brentsville Historic Trust decided to replace the bell "as is" back into the restored cupola. Funds do not exist at this time to restore and/or clean the bell. Until such a time arises, the

Friends of Brentsville Courthouse will continue to research the history of the bell and consult bell restoration experts to get an idea about the best way to preserve this "ring" for the future.

Wouldn't it be nice to hear the bell once again ring on special occasions, or to summon citizens to Court Days? Stay tuned.

GMU Professor to be Guest Speaker at February Meeting



Dr. Randy Lytton, Assistant Professor of History at George Mason University will be a guest speaker at our February General Membership meeting. Please feel free to invite your family and neighbors to join us for a pot luck luncheon on Saturday, February 9th from NOON until 2:00 PM in the Brentsville One Room School House, 12239 Bris-

tow Road. In honor of President's Day, Dr. Lytton's topic will be "Thomas Lord Fairfax."

Lord Fairfax was a friend and mentor to George Washington. In 1747, following the completion of his home "Belvoir," Fairfax enjoyed the distinction of being the only "peer" from the British House of Lords living in America. A year later, Fairfax employed a youthful George Washington to survey his land west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. He later became a patron to the future "Founding Father." Of interest to Prince William County residents, Lord Fairfax bestowed a land grant of 180 acres in 1731, to one of our county's earliest settlers and Clerk of the Court, Catesby Cocke.

Dr. Lytton will speak for about 45 minutes and take questions from the audience. Professor Lytton is President of "Historic Fairfax City, Inc." and curator of an exhibit at the Fairfax Museum entitled "Thomas Lord Fairfax, George Washington and the Fairfax County Courthouse." Following Dr. Lytton's presentation, a potluck lunch will be shared with attendees.

"We hope that people take advantage of

this opportunity to learn more about our regional Colonial history in the classroom of our One Room School House," said Pamela Sackett, Chairman of the Friends of Brentsville Courthouse Historic Centre, Inc. Visitors to the site can see the newly restored Courthouse cupola and view the extensive renovations underway at the Brentsville Courthouse and the Union Church.


